The children had some lovely ideas about what made 'a life well lived' - they talked about being kind to others, about being part of a loving family, about excelling in something like sport or music and about just being happy. Everyone enjoyed looking at lots of photos from different times in his life. Our theme for this term is compassion, so we talked about feeling compassion for the Queen and the Royal Family at this difficult time, but we also extended this to thinking about those who have lost loved ones for other reasons, including the pandemic.

### **Easter**

Easter was celebrated with a special pilgrimage. The children were given the opportunity to go on a pilgrimage around fifteen 'Stations of the Cross' displays which Mrs Bacon had created. Each station told a small piece of the Easter story with questions and activities provided to help the children reflect on what was happening and think about their own beliefs and values. It was lovely to see the children calmly and sensibly following the journey on two sunny spring days—they shared some interesting thoughts and views. Many thanks to Mrs Bacon for her hard work in finding a way for the School to celebrate this important Christian festival in a Covid-friendly manner.

#### **Environmental Action!**

We had a lovely morning planting trees on our school field with lots of help from parents and the community. We are very grateful to Ken Jackson who secured the trees for us and to Mr Probert for allowing us to plant the trees on our field. Our thanks must also go to Edward Van Ek at The Woodland Trust who supplied us with the trees at no cost. Here is a bit more information from Daniel in Year 6 who is passionate about environmental issues.

"Today we planted 40 trees at the field. Lots of children helped to plant the trees for shade during summer. Every person needs seven to eight trees for oxygen. It would help if you could also plant trees and encourage others to plant them; helping us would be perfect - by growing more we could help many animals and each other. The importance of trees is vital and the exceptionally wonderful home it can be for many species of animals of different kinds. We here at Bures Primary School are delighted to help plant trees."
